

Tutor Tips

"To tutor is to learn twice" Joseph Joubert

Last week, I ran into a friend who told me that she had stopped tutoring many years ago (not at LVWC) because her student never put in the work of learning English. She tired of trying to motivate him. She became frustrated that he didn't progress because he didn't take responsibility for his language learning. In fact, he told her, emphatically, he just wanted to snap his fingers and immediately become fluent.

Wouldn't we all?

In the real world, of course, we know that learning English or any language is a process with a nonlinear trajectory. To make progress requires effort, practice, repetition, mistakes with setbacks and successes for the learner. The dictionary defines "process" as a "series of actions or steps taken in order to achieve a particular end." I'd like to highlight several dynamics of the tutoring process.

The one-on-one tutoring at LVWC is a partnership. The process expects buy-in and commitment from the learner. Working with a tutor is a participatory sport. Both tutor and student must "be on the same page" in terms of objectives. Most importantly, the student must be willing to be an active learner, putting in the effort and energy that that entails, at least in weekly sessions if not in homework!

We know that our adult students, like us, bring their work, family, and life responsibilities, unique backgrounds, education, learning preferences, personalities, etc., with them. Consideration and respect for these individual situations should inform our tutoring.

As you know our program at LVWC is student centered. Flexible tutors tailor their sessions to address the student's evolving specific needs. In

practice this means that tutors talk less and listen/observe more. In education-ese, this is called "informal or formative assessment." It is the reflecting and observation you do every time you meet with your student to see their progress (or lack thereof). This "noticing" is much more nuanced than standardized testing and much more helpful in tweaking your sessions to meet your student's needs and goals. It is also organic and ever-changing, as you know. One week, you may notice that your student's pronunciation is precise. The following week, they've "forgotten."

Because tutors here are not handed a onesize-fits-all set of lesson plans, they naturally seek out resources and guidance to support their unique situations. As Theresa and I have said many times, you don't have to reinvent the wheel. Whatever challenge you may face along the bumpy road to fluency has usually emerged before. We can advise you on resources and strategies. That's what we're here for. We also love suggestions for what works for you!

Our ongoing support extends to when or if the student/tutor process stalls. It happens, though rarely, in any process involving adults. If, for any reason, you feel your tutoring has reached its limit, we're here to make necessary adjustments. We handle this transition or ending in a student/tutor relationship thoughtfully and professionally. From experience, we've learned to explain to the student that the tutor's situation has changed and she/he is no longer available to tutor the student. Depending on their preferences, students and/or tutors can be reassigned.
